## Housing and Productivity Research Consortium Project 1: Housing and the Economy Scenarios for Australia to 2025 and 2045



- UNSW S Y D N E Y
- ➤ 2020 Extending Economics Cases for Housing identified key research questions about the links between housing outcomes, productivity, stability and affordability
- ➤ Signalled an imperative for a significant pivot in the development of housing policies in Australia and elsewhere:
  - Persistent and rising homelessness
  - Lengthening queues for affordable rental housing
  - Pervasive affordability pressures for middle and lower-income households
  - The rise of Generation Rent and Rentvesting
- ➤ All suggest that well-established patterns in housing choices and careers may no longer hold (impact of COVID 19?)
- ➤ Earlier research suggests the effects of high housing costs had reduced the productivity of human capital in significant ways major economic productivity effects

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- ➤ The aim of the research is to develop a clear understanding of the potential dynamics of the Australian housing system over the longer term (25 45 years)
- It will involve a range of leading housing economists and industry experts in a high level and strategic moderated 'debate' that will synthesise a range of informed opinions as to how the Australian housing system will evolve into the foreseeable future
- > Two components:

Literature review – what is the evidence on the productivity impacts of housing costs on the wider economy

Delphi study:

- Seeks to harness the views of an 'expert panel' on the future of the Australian housing system through a scaled survey questionnaire
- This will generate a composite picture of this future by synthesizing the collective view
- This collective view is then tested with selected participants through follow-up indepth interviews allowing further refinement
